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Introduction & Motivations

#### Overview

<u>def:</u> transient process by which a fluid adjusts to time-dependent boundary conditions



- fluid assumed to be in solid body rotation
- rotation rate of the container modified: increased (spin-up) or decreased (spin-down)
- adjustment of the primary circulation to the new rotation rate

## Geophysical Context

#### Response mechanism to external forcing which arises in the oceans



(a) Where Ekman transport moves surface waters away from the coast, these are replaced by denser water that wells up from below



(b) Wind-driven currents and Ekman flow can result in vertical motions forming depressions or hills in the open ocean

## Geophysical Context

Central to an understanding of dissipation for large scale motions



(c) simplified path of the global density-driven circulation of the oceans (thermohaline circulation)

NADW = North Atlantic Deep Water



(d) Fraction of NADW for a quasimeridional section through the western basin of the Atlantic Ocean

## Background

Existence of separated time scales

 $E\equiv\nu/\Omega H^2$ 

- 1) Ekman boundary layers development:
- 2) spin-up due to a secondary circulation:
- 3) viscous dissipation of residual motions:

$$\begin{split} \tau^*_e &= \Omega^{-1} \\ \tau^*_s &= \Omega^{-1} E^{-1/2} \\ \tau^*_v &= \Omega^{-1} E^{-1} \end{split}$$

Large body of work on the axisymmetric stratified spin-up, but not much on the non-axisymmetric counterpart

- numerical models: axisymmetric in nature
- experimental investigations: only in small facilities

#### $E \sim O(10^{-5})$

## 1) optimal separation between the time scales

2) relatively long spin-up time

#### Objectives

- a) comparison of the experimental results with the analytical theory of Walin (1969)
- b) study of the effects of non-axisymmetric disturbances on the momentum transport in spin-up time

## Spin-up - Homogeneous Fluid



The convergence of the planetary vortex lines in the inviscid interior increases the positive absolute vorticity by reducing the negative relative vorticity

## Stratified Fluid

The presence of stratification introduces physical mechanisms wholly lacking in the homogeneous system

#### **Outstanding effects**

- inhibition of vertical motions by buoyancy force
- presence of horizontal density gradients
- baroclinic instability (Bu < 1)
- vertical shear of the horizontal velocity

 $Bu \equiv N^2 H^2 / \Omega^2 L^2$

## Stratified Fluid - Holton (1965)

Governing Eq.ns scaled by  $\tau_s = E^{-1/2}$ 

 $\Rightarrow$  information on different time scales is lost

- Ekman layers have the same structure as in homogeneous case
- interior region governed by

QGPV Eq.n  $\delta \equiv H/L$  $\frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left( \nabla_h^2 \psi + \frac{\delta^2}{Bu} \frac{\partial^2 \psi}{\partial z^2} \right) = 0$  $\psi \equiv p_{(0)}$ 

• secondary circulation restricted to the rotational shear layer  $(h_p \sim H/Bu^{1/2})$  by a stable stratification

## Salt-stratified Fluid - Walin (1969)

- no transport in the sidewall layer due to buoyancy force
- Ekman flow enters in the interior from corner regions

The adjustment mechanism is localized:  $H \rightarrow h_p \sim H/Bu^{1/2}$  $\tau_{ss} \sim \tau_s/Bu^{1/2}$ 

• interior azimuthal velocity field – analytical solution

#### **Experimental Set-up**



The Coriolis turntable, thanks to its large size (D = 13 m), provides access to non-dimensional parameters relevant in geophysical applications, e.g.,  $\delta \sim O(10^{-1})$ ,  $E \sim O(10^{-5})$

#### **Experimental Runs**

A series of incremental spin-up and spin-down run pairs were performed, fixing the final rotation period for each pair

The flow response depends on several dimensional parameters

$$\Omega \quad \Delta \Omega \quad N \equiv \sqrt{-(g/\rho)(\partial \rho/\partial z)} \quad R \quad H \quad \nu \quad \kappa$$

Dimensional Analysis:RoBuE $\delta$  $\sigma \equiv v/\kappa$  $E \sim O(10^{-5})$  $\delta$  fixed $\sigma \sim O(10^3)$  $\Rightarrow$  flow evolution primarily determined by Ro and Bu

**Experimental Results** 

#### Influence of the Rossby number

Azimuthal velocity decay: UP 1 {*Ro* = 0.08} — ; UP 3 {*Ro* = 0.16} —



 $Bu = 0.26; r^*/R = 0.80; z^*/H = 0.75$ 

- basic decay not altered by *Ro* < 0.20
- study of the effects of non-vanishing Ro left out

## Influence of the Burger number

Azimuthal velocity: temporal evolution of the vertical profile at  $r^*/R = 0.85$ 



- *Bu* > 1: linear vertical profile
- Bu < 1: the nature of the instability must be addressed

• baroclinic instability increases the vertical transport of horizontal momentum

## Stable Spin-up





Experimental results:  $- r^*/R = 0.70;$   $- r^*/R = 0.80;$   $- r^*/R = 0.90$ Walin's solution:  $r^*/R = 0.70;$   $r^*/R = 0.80;$   $r^*/R = 0.90$ 

- vortex-stretching stronger at smaller radii
- experimental results decay faster than Walin's theory

## Stable Spin-up

#### Stratified vs Homogeneous spin-up

Viscous effects enhanced in stratified case since the confinement of the meridional circulation produces vertical flow gradients

Spin-up of a stratified fluid controlled by both the inviscid dynamics and viscous-diffusion effects

Any viable model for stratified spin-up should include the viscous-diffusion effects in both the regions (Hyun (1983))

Improvement to Walin's theory

Inclusion of vertical diffusion of momentum

## Stable Spin-up

UP 3 {Bu = 4.34}: azimuthal velocity decay at  $r^*/R = 0.85$ ;  $z^*/H = 0.10$ 



- viscous effects observable in  $\tau_{ss}$
- baroclinic instability at large times

## Stable Spin-up

UP 3 {Bu = 4.34}: azimuthal velocity decay at  $r^*/R = 0.85$ ;  $z^*/H = 0.50$ 



- remarkable penetration depth ( $h_p/H \simeq 0.50$ )
- general improvement including vertical diffusion

UP 3 {Bu = 4.34}: azimuthal velocity decay at  $r^*/R = 0.85$ ;  $z^*/H = 0.80$ 



- preeminent role of vertical diffusion
- accordance even at  $Re \sim O(10^4)$

#### Unstable Spin-up

UP 1 {Bu = 0.26}: azimuthal velocity decay at  $r^*/R = 0.85$ ;  $z^*/H = 0.20$ 



- experimental results decay slower than theory
- baroclinic instability does not increase the vertical transport of horizontal momentum
- attainment of solid body rotation similar to homogeneous case

Azimuthal velocity averaged in small boxes such as they had the same radial coordinate and different azimuthal position

## Unstable Spin-up

Baroclinic instability: the Eady's model (1949)

• perturbation of the interior pressure

$$\phi = |A(z)|e^{kc_i t}\cos(k\theta - \omega t + \alpha)\cos l_m r$$

 $\omega=2\pi f^*/f_0, l_m=(m+1/2)\pi$

## Unstable Spin-up

• growth rate: mismatch with classical Eady's model



A good agreement is obtained using the model derived by Smirnov *et al.* (2005) with the actual vertical shear

## Unstable Spin-up

#### Velocity field as composition of two mechanisms

- 1) axisymmetric relative current
- 2) long-wave oscillations

Moving average algorithm used as low-frequency band pass filter this tool removes the short term fluctuations leaving only the long term trend

Horizontal perturbation patterr

reconstructed by shifting and merging the fluctuation velocity fields

#### Conclusions

#### STABLE CASE

- optimal separation between the time scales
- importance of viscous effects captured by the model

#### **UNSTABLE CASE**

- baroclinic instability is the most plausible explanation for the existence of long-wave instability
- the claim "baroclinic instability increase the vertical transport of horizontal momentum" is shown to be questionable

## Perspectives

- more proper inclusion of viscous effects in Walin's solution
  - a) quantitative description of the relative importance of viscous effects and inviscid dynamics
  - b) reliable initial condition for the study of baroclinic instability

• investigation of the further development of the baroclinic instability in large facility (vortex coalescence)

 stratified spin-up over a sloping bottom (Ekman layer arrest)

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Axisymmetric container

Greenspan & Howard (1963): incremental (linear) spin-up

• simplest case: spin-up in double-disc system



The combination of two plane discs rotating in unison produces a motion which typifies all contained spin-up flows

- spin-up in double-disc system
- quasi-steady approximation

bottom Ekman layer  

$$-2u_{\theta} = E \frac{\partial^{2} u_{r}}{\partial z^{2}}$$

#### **Ekman spiral**

( $\Omega_f$  frame)

$$\begin{aligned} u_r(r,z) &= -U_\theta(r)e^{-z/E^{1/2}}\sin(z/E^{1/2}) \\ u_\theta(r,z) &= U_\theta(r)\Big[1-e^{-z/E^{1/2}}\cos(z/E^{1/2})\Big] \end{aligned}$$



E<sup>1/2</sup> boundary layer thickness

• the Ekman layer acts to convert the no-slip condition on the azimuthal velocity in a normal condition on the interior flow

Ekman pumping/suction
$$w = \frac{E^{1/2}}{2}\omega_z$$



 the effect of the boundary layer is communicated to the interior region through a secondary circulation



#### P.I.V. technique

Projection of the fluid velocity in the laser sheet plane



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- the flow is seeded with particles
- a laser beam is formed to a light sheet
- the light scattered is recorded as images
- the images subdivided into small boxes
- the particle displacement determined by cross-correlation (C.I.V.)

#### Stable Spin-up - Ekman layer



UP 3 {Bu = 4.34}; azimuthal velocity

- theory accurately predicts the flow evolution in case of locations and times for which the secondary circulation is strong
- no-slip conditions directly satisfied over τ<sub>ss</sub> without undergoing boundary-like variations



## My model

Inclusion of vertical momentum diffusion in Walin's solution

- $\mathbf{u}_{i}^{t}$  azimuthal velocity at time  $\mathbf{t}$  and vertical location  $\mathbf{i}$
- $\mathbf{u}_{\mathbf{W}\mathbf{i}}^{\mathbf{t}}$  Walin's analytical solution (a priori known)

• at 
$$\mathbf{t} = \mathbf{0}$$
  $\mathbf{u}_i^0 = \mathbf{1}$  solid body rotation

• at t = 1  $u_i^1 = u_{Wi}^1$  non-uniform spin-up due to the secondary circulation • at t = 2, ..., n (loop)

 $\begin{array}{l} u_{Di}^t = u_i^{t-1} + s \Big( u_{i+1}^{t-1} - 2 u_i^{t-1} + u_{i-1}^{t-1} \Big) & \mbox{vertical diffusion} \\ u_i^t = u_{Di}^t + \Delta u_{Wi} & \mbox{non-uniform spin-up due to the secondary circulation} \end{array}$ 

being  $\mathbf{s} = \mathbf{E}\Delta t/(\Delta z)^2$ ,  $\Delta u_{Wi} = u_{Wi}^t - u_{Wi}^{t-1}$ 



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## Unstable Spin-up

#### Recent works

- Flor *et al.* (2004): baroclinic instability at the interfaces between interior and corner regions
- <u>Kanda (2004)</u>: front structure near the sidewall ? classical Eady-type baroclinic instability ?
- <u>Smirnov et al. (2005)</u>: instability was not consistent with the classical Eady's model
  - extended Eady's model (sidewall boundary layer taken into account)
  - the sidewall boundary layers compensates for the narrowness of the cylinder

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#### Ekman layer arrest



(a) Lateral variations in the current cause variations of the flux in the Ekman layer, and force flow into, or out of, the interior. Coriolis force acting on this flow then reduces the initial current in the interior.



(b) The advection of density gives rise to a buoyancy force which opposes crossslope motion. When the final balance is achieved, the interior flow feels a nearly free-slip condition at the seafloor.
