→ Order of magnitude calculation time: dynamic polarisation curve  $\approx$  1 minute, U(t) (1000 h) for case accounting for Pt degradation < 5 minutes

- → Interfaces for parameter estimation toolboxes integrated
- $\rightarrow$  To be commercialized







# **Example #1: i-V characteristics**

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□ Powerful tool to capture behaviors at different scales.

□ E.g.: cathode Pt coverage w/o materials aging (stepped i-V curve).







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## Example #5: PEM aging



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□ PEM degradation: elementary kinetic model of the PEM side chain degradation (detailed description of anodic  $H_2O_2$  production, Fenton's reactions and side chain chemical degradation).

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□ Impact of nominal current on Pt surface area evolution and ORR ad-species



✓ Ionomer coverage higher at high current→ stronger poisoning effect.



#### **Example #6: cathode C corrosion**



Perspectives

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□ Impact of nominal current on Pt surface area evolution and ORR ad-species



 At short-term, catalyst surface area increases with time: catalyst in smaller pores becomes exposed to water and ionomer. At long-term, catalyst surface area decreases (detachment).

- ✓ OH coverage increases with time→ effective catalyst activity decay.
- ✓ Ionomer coverage higher at high current→ stronger poisoning effect.

□ CEA multiscale/multiphysics model MEMEPhys<sup>®</sup> allows describing the nanomaterials (e.g. Pt, Pt<sub>x</sub>M<sub>y</sub> catalysts, C support, PEM...) degradation in in situ PEMFC conditions, on the basis of an *ab initio*-based elementary kinetics/non-equilibrium thermodynamics framework (bottom-up approach):

→ analysis of competitive aging mechanisms and cell durability prediction (without using empirical Butler-Volmer approach).

#### □ In practice:

- → experimental observables (polarisation curves, EIS...) from first principles: useful for experiments interpretation.
- → microstructure-performance-durability relationships for the MEA materials: useful for materials design
- Re-usable/evolutive approach:
  - $\rightarrow$  possibility of refining physics in a given module without changing the rest of the model.

  - → implementation of new phenomena (mechanical stresses, thermal issues)
  - $\rightarrow$  continuation of experimental validation (e.g. EU project PREMIUM ACT)
  - $\rightarrow$  interpolated relationships for simplified models $\rightarrow$  stack perspective
  - ✓ Improvement of global MEMEPhys<sup>®</sup> model:
    - $\rightarrow$  structural identifiability analysis
    - →sympletic discretization methods (e.g. EU project MMM@HPC or joint thesis with LAGEP?)
    - $\rightarrow$  user-friendly interface for non-specialists (including experimentalists).
    - $\rightarrow$  commercialization perspective within 3-4 years
