My research motivations within PEM Fuel Cells



➤ **PEMFC:** electric generator by transformation of the energy “stored” in molecular hydrogen. Concept: 1838 (Sir Grove); first PEMFC: 1959 (Grubb & Niedrach); first modern PEMFC: 1991 (LANL).

Some advantages:

Fast start-up, dynamic operation with shutdown (low working temperature), compact units, lot of applications from portable electronics to vehicles
 ⇒ Most important developments during the last ten years

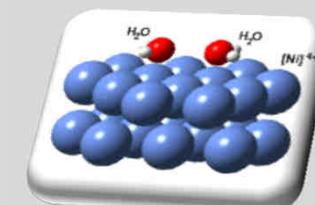
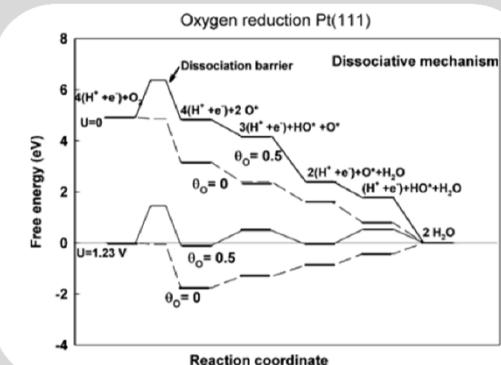
□ Some available modeling approaches of PEMFC performance:

- CFD (detailed description of thermofluidics, charge transport phenomena, simplified electrochemistry -Butler Volmer theory-): e.g. C.Y. Wang.
- Analytical, model reduction: e.g. M. Eikerling, A. Kulikovsky.
- PEMFC as a complex physical system constituted by several sub-systems in interaction (Bond Graphs): e.g. my PhD thesis (2003-2005).



□ Some available modeling approaches of PEMFC materials:

- DFT (e.g. detailed description of electrochemical reactions), challenges: e.g. T. Jacob, J. Norskov (challenges: $T > 0$ K, solvent + ionomer, electric field, scaling up into kinetic models)

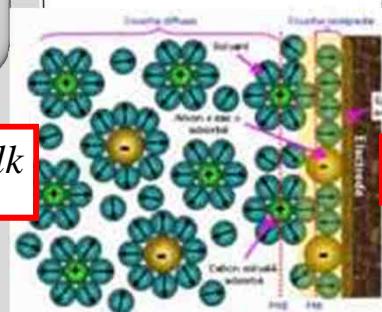

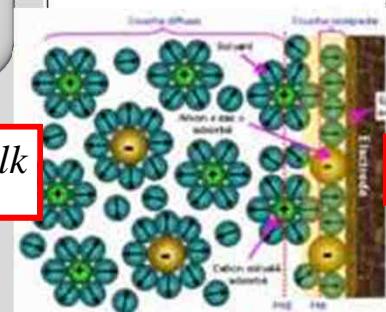

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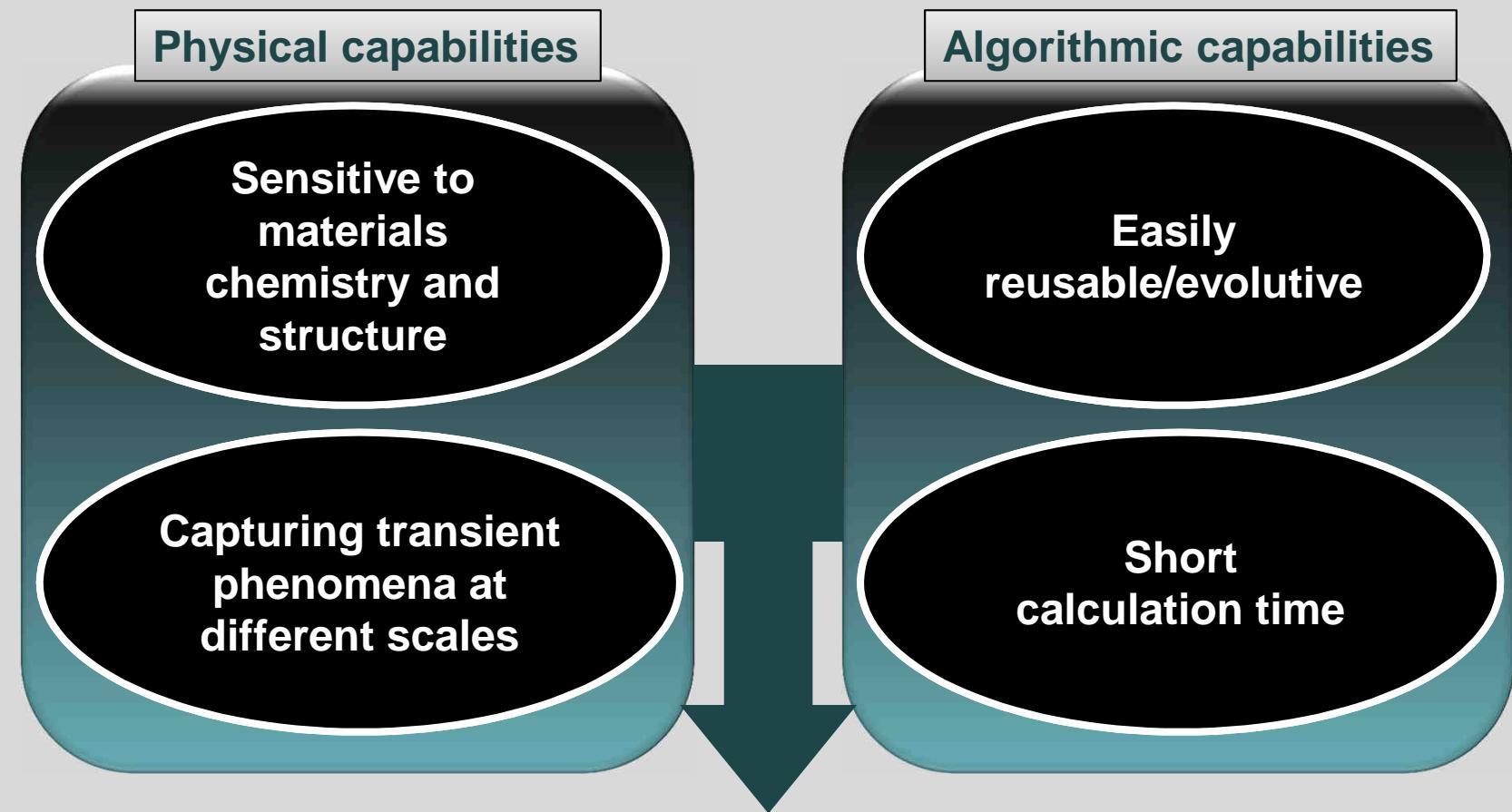

“Ideal model”: needs from an industrial viewpoint

- “Time is money”: typical cost of a single cell 500 h durability test = 1000 euros (+ test line=95000 euros) → need of *in silico* experiments to speed up the PEMFC development.

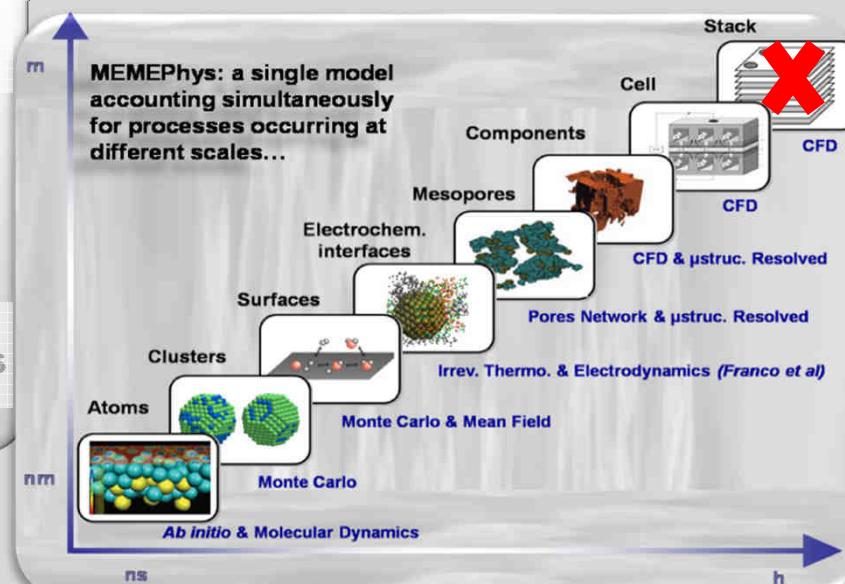

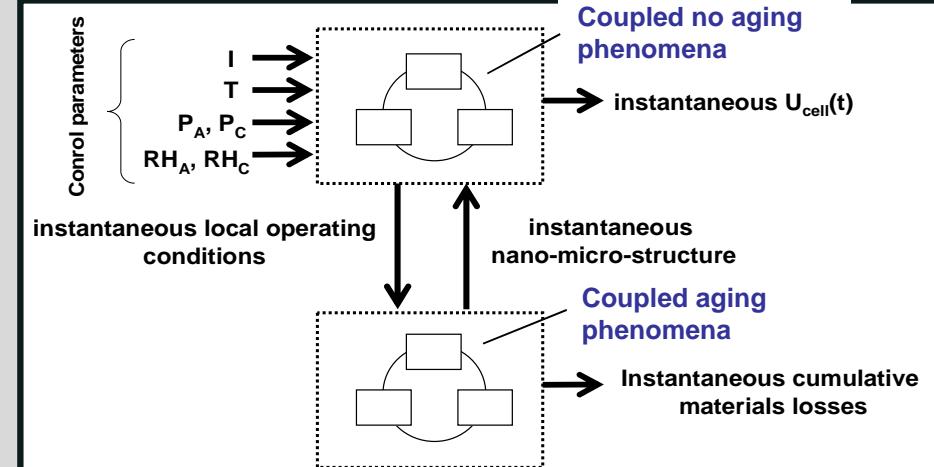

My multiscale model of PEMFC: MEMEPhys®

- **MEMEPhys® (9 years of development by myself):** multiscale mechanistic model of the electrochemical processes, scaling up *ab initio* concepts into an irreversible thermodynamics framework, accounting, within a *continuum* framework, for:
 - the MEA physicochemistry at spatial nano, micro and mesoscales, GDL and channels at the macroscale
 - the intrinsic MEA nanomaterials degradation and couplings between aging mechanisms

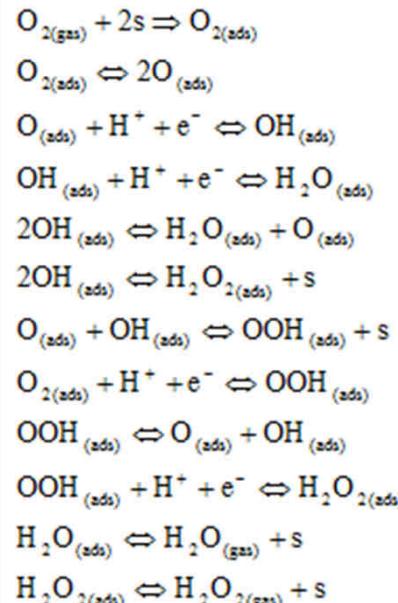
Ab initio-based elementary kinetics @ MEMEPhys®



- No global reactions! No Butler-Volmer equations!
- DFT-generated database of adsorption and reactivity properties of Pt, Pt-free, Pt-M materials (surface PBC calculations -VASP-, for Pt and bimetallics 5/6-layer slab without solvent; or NPBC ADF).
- Databases of Pt, Pt-M, C and ionomer stability properties.
- Identification of most favorable reaction steps and pathways using NEB and integration in MEMEPhys® (DFT-based kinetic parameters: **initial guess values**).
- Captures nanostructural and chemistry properties of the materials.

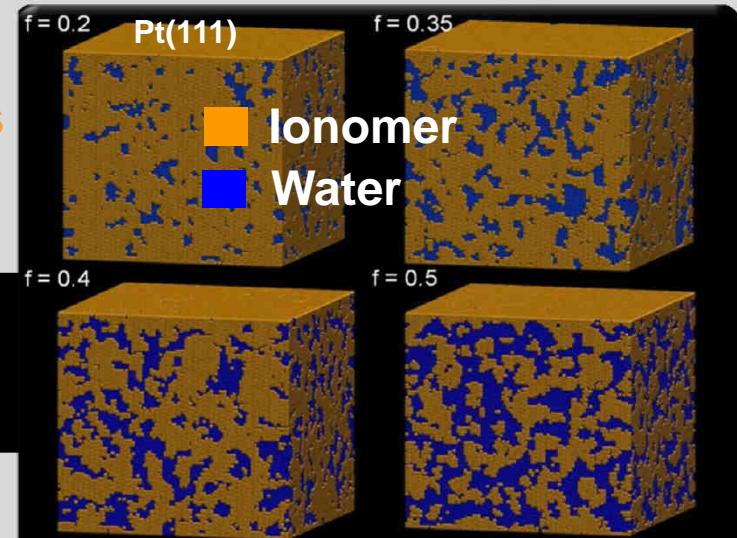
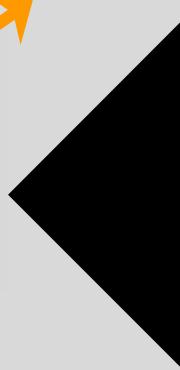
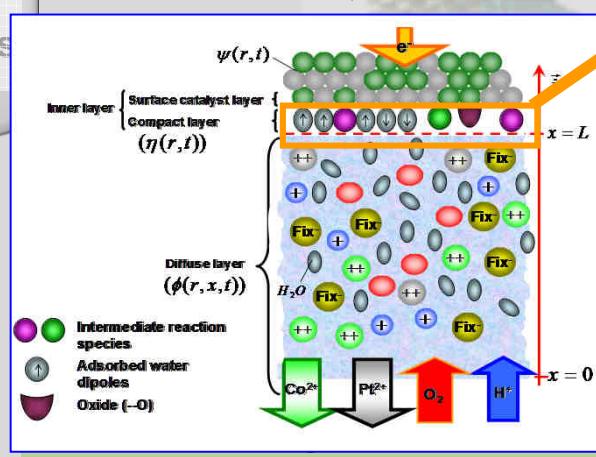


- Nanoscale model describing the interface structure during the electrochemical processes (including degradation): **non-equilibrium model**.
- Diffuse layer: PNP or grand canonical Monte Carlo calculation of interfacial charge distribution (protons, parasitic ions, sulfonate groups). Inner layer: elementary kinetics + parasitic H₂O adsorption.

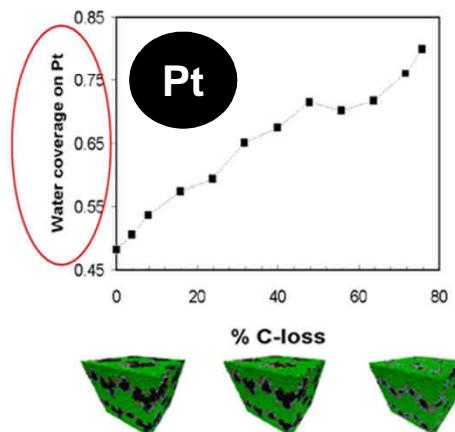
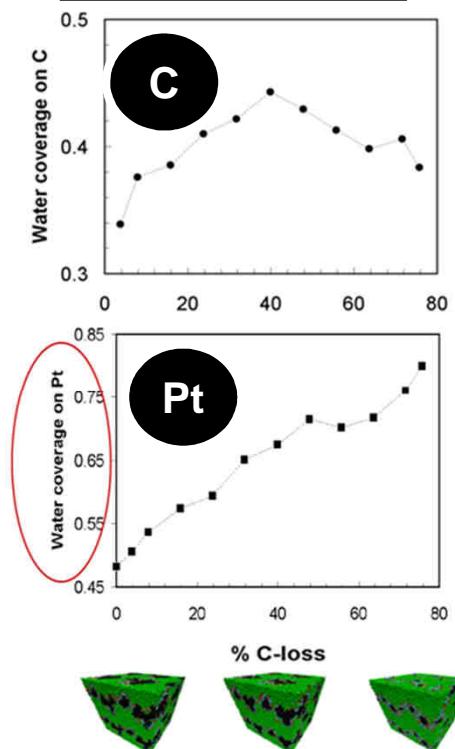
CGMD-predicted mesostructure evolution

Bond Graph: modular structure

□ Network modeling: the overall system is decomposed into subsystems interconnected to each other through pairs of conjugated variables (product = power exchanged between the subsystems)

□ Advantages:

- ✓ reusability of subsystem models (libraries),
- ✓ flexibility (coarse models of subsystems may be replaced by more refined ones leaving the rest of the system modeling untouched),
- ✓ hierarchical modeling,
- ✓ acausality,
- ✓ useful for the systematic modeling of multi-physics systems, where the subsystems belong to different physical domains (mechanical, electrical, hydraulic, etc.).

Algorithm within MEMEPhys®

- ❑ Modular interface: constitutive and conservation equations kept separately → easy to change physical assumptions (constitutive relationships) and geometries / **flexible environment**.
 - ❑ Integration of aging-induced parameters evolution through libraries or through fractal evolution “laws”.
 - ❑ Variable-step solver to manage fast (e.g. chemical reaction with $\tau \approx 10^{-6}$ s) and slow processes (e.g. transport with $\tau \approx 10^{-1}$ s).
 - ❑ In-house code combining C + Matlab®/Simulink® + Comsol Multiphysics®.
 - ❑ Electrode macro-spatial meshing along the thickness and along the channels.
 - ❑ Possibility of implementing both uniform and non-uniform 1D + 1D meshing.

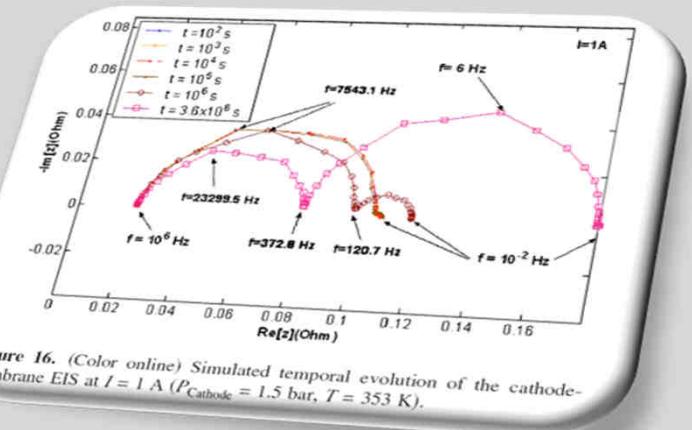
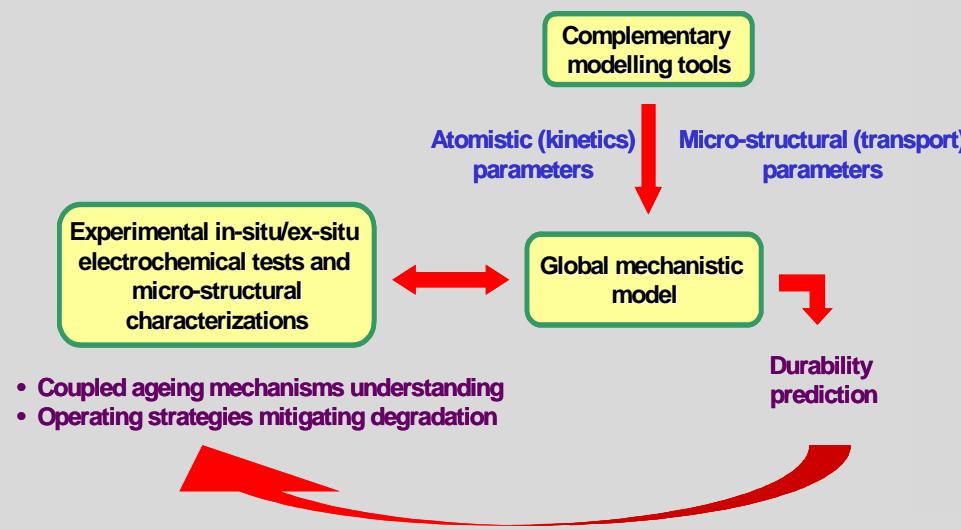


Figure 16. (Color online) Simulated temporal evolution of the cathode-membrane EIS at $I = 1$ A ($P_{\text{Cathode}} = 1.5$ bar, $T = 353$ K).

Example: simulation of cathode EIS evolution during catalyst degradation

- Order of magnitude calculation time: dynamic polarisation curve \approx 1 minute, $U(t)$ (1000 h) for case accounting for Pt degradation < 5 minutes
 - Interfaces for parameter estimation toolboxes integrated

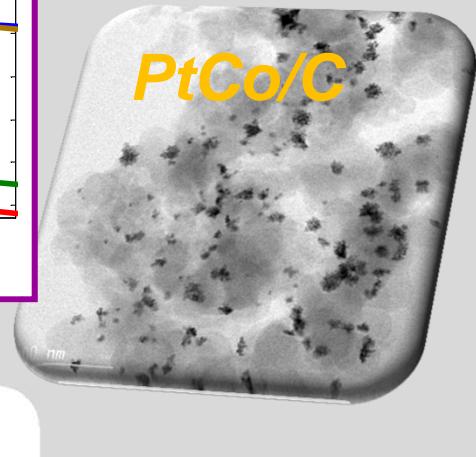
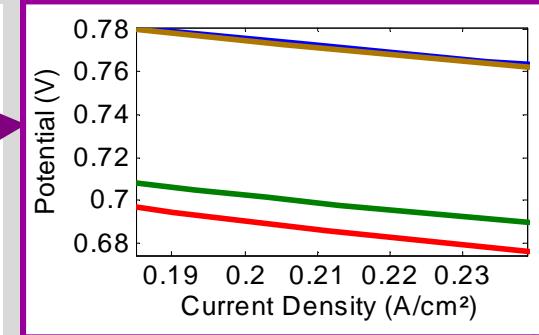
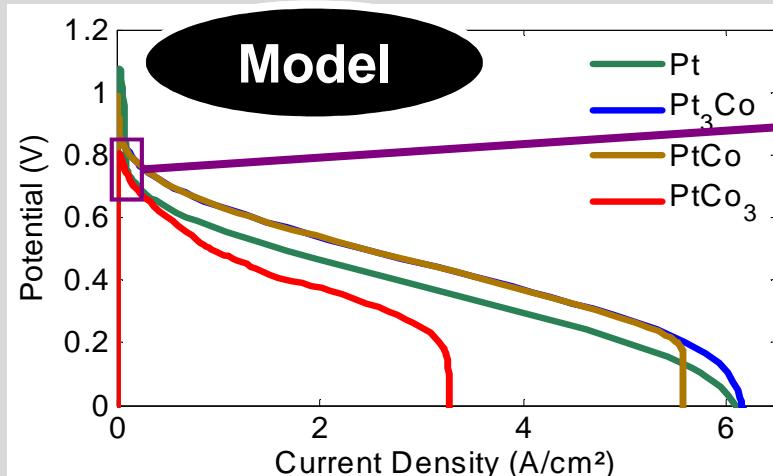
Example #2: catalyst activity “benchmarking” (1/2)

- Very flexible modeling tool to predict catalysts activities, stabilities and tolerances to external pollutants (“benchmarking”).

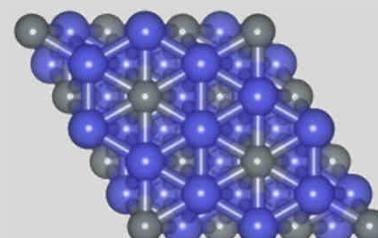


Example #2: catalyst activity “benchmarking” (2/2)

- Predicted trends in good agreement with half-cell experimental results.



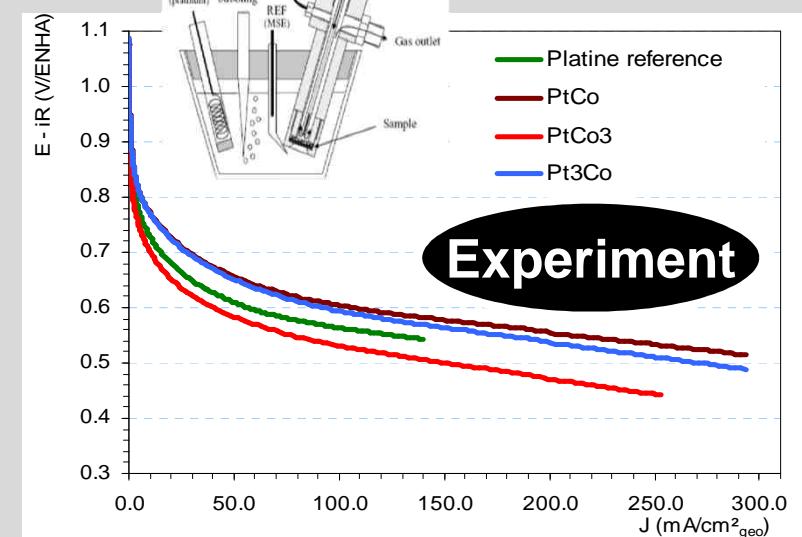

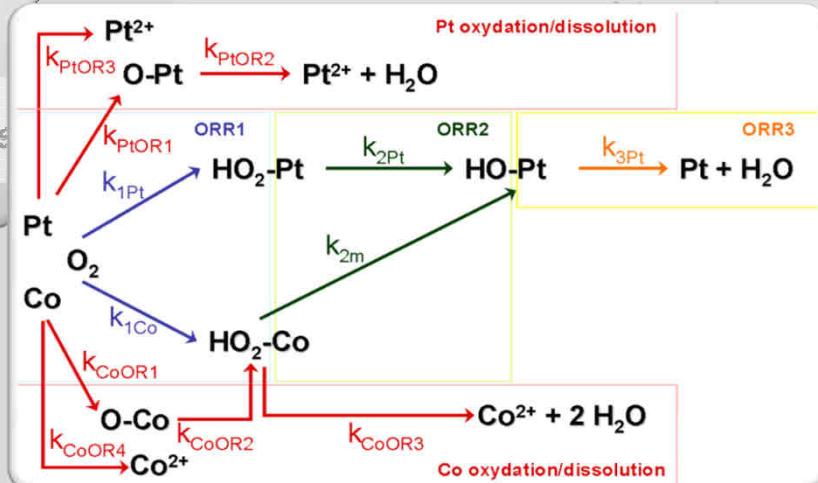
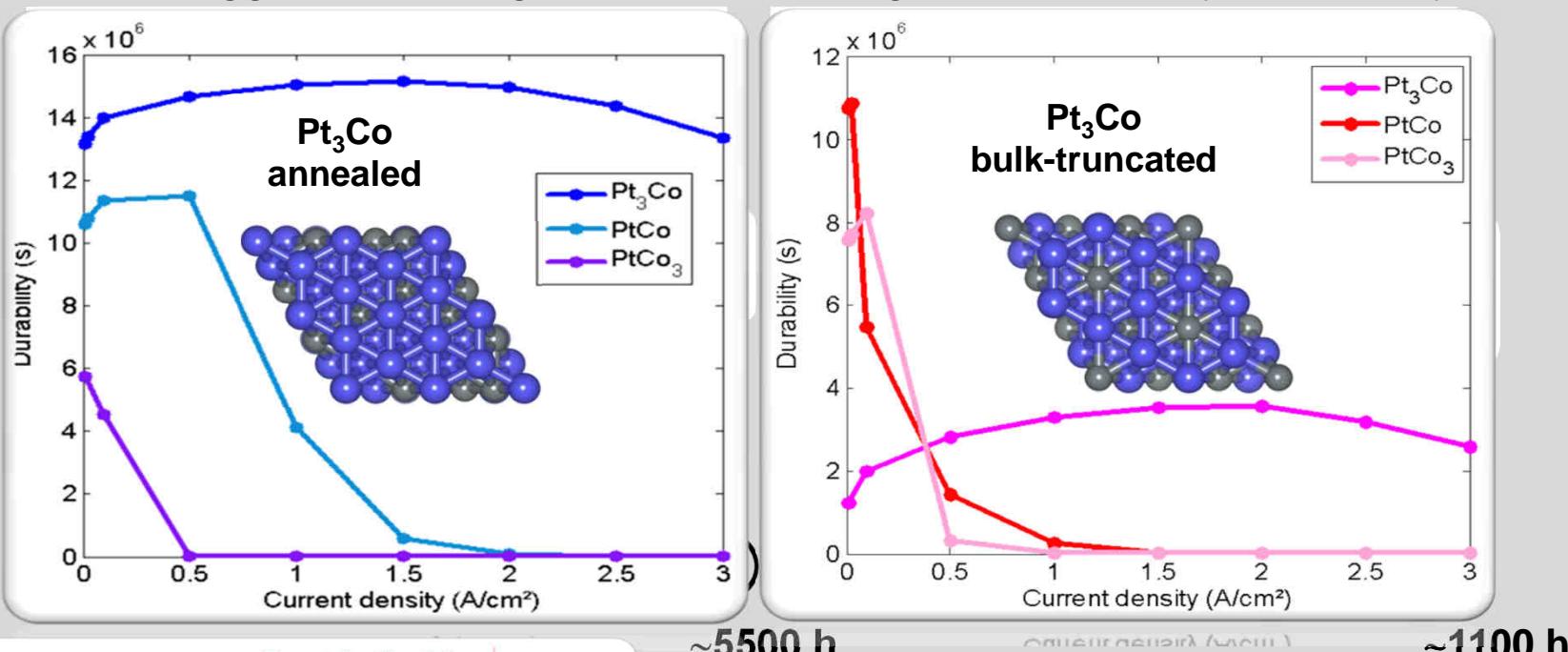
- ORR mechanism appears strongly coupled to material (both Pt and Co) degradation → **elementary kinetic steps with time-dependent rates**.
- HO intermediate adsorbs preferentially on Pt.
- Co dissolves better than Pt when the two materials coexist at the surface (“sacrificial” mechanism).

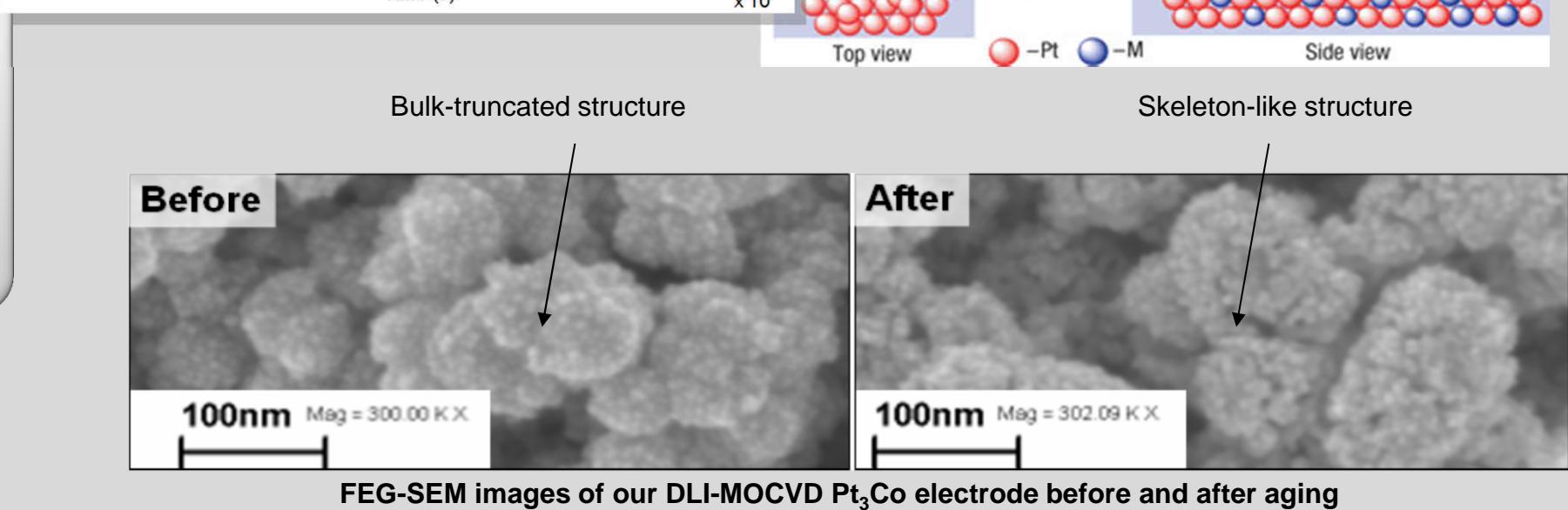
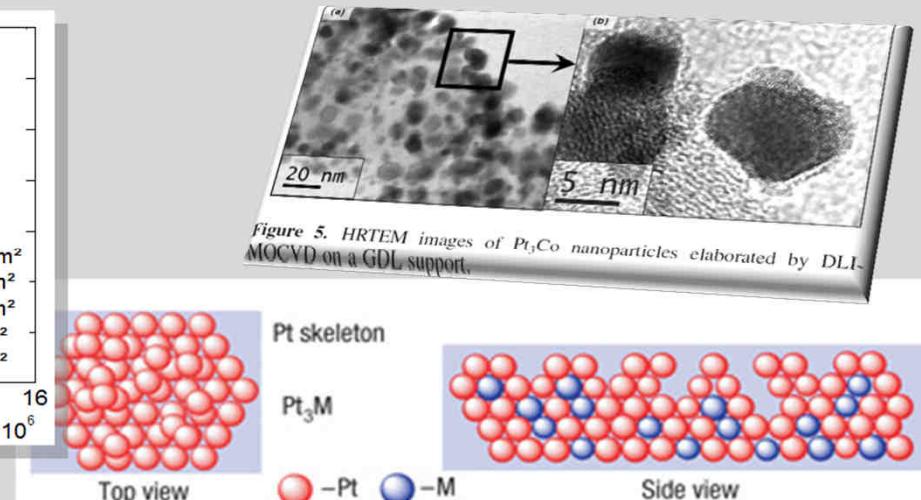
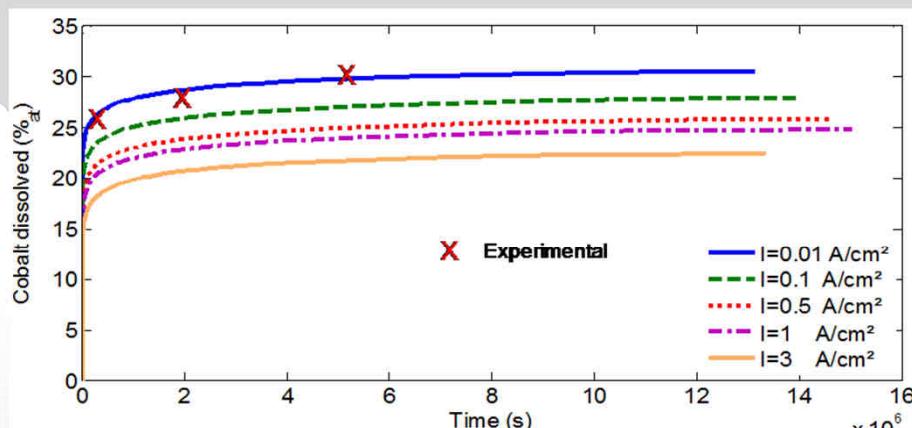

Example #3: catalyst stability “benchmarking” (2/2)

- Predicted impact of current on dissolved Co amount from a bulk-truncated Pt_xCo_y .
- Predicted and experimental degradation impact on structure: becomes more and more as an “emmental cheese” or “skeleton”-structure.

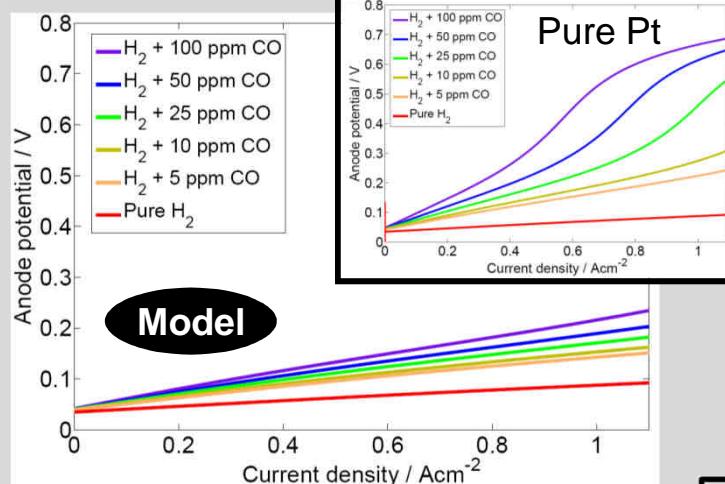

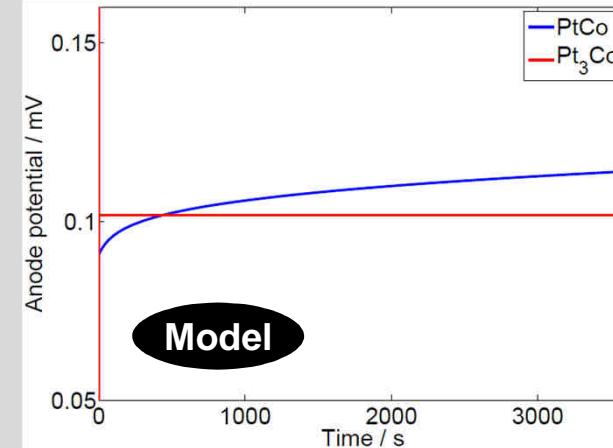

□ CO effects on structural stability of Pt_xCo_y catalysts.

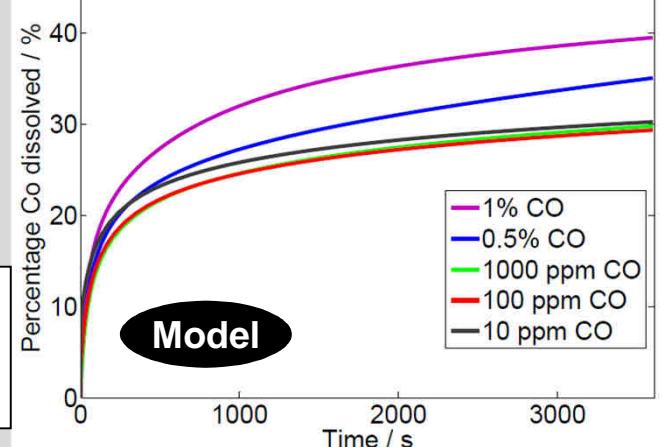
Pt_3Co catalyst has high CO tolerance

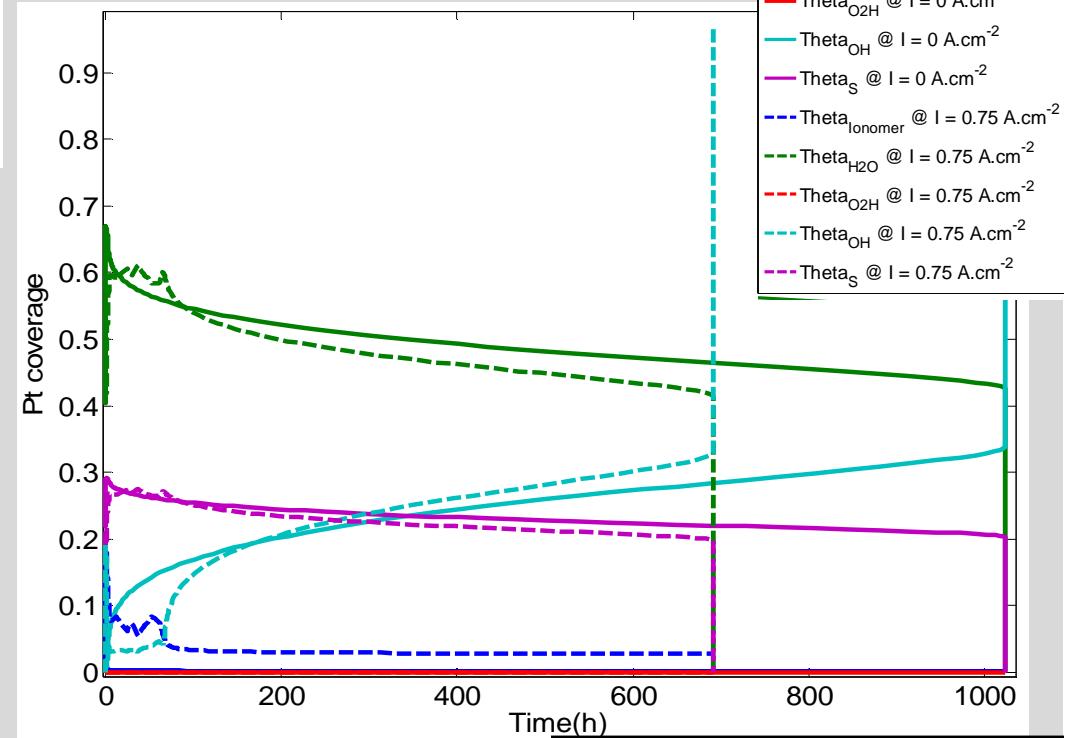
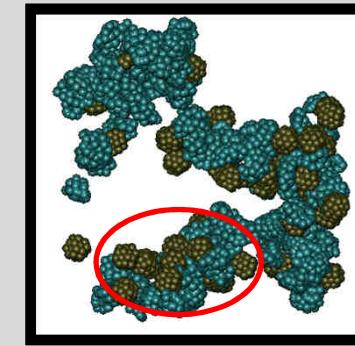
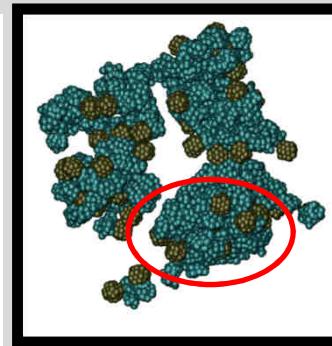
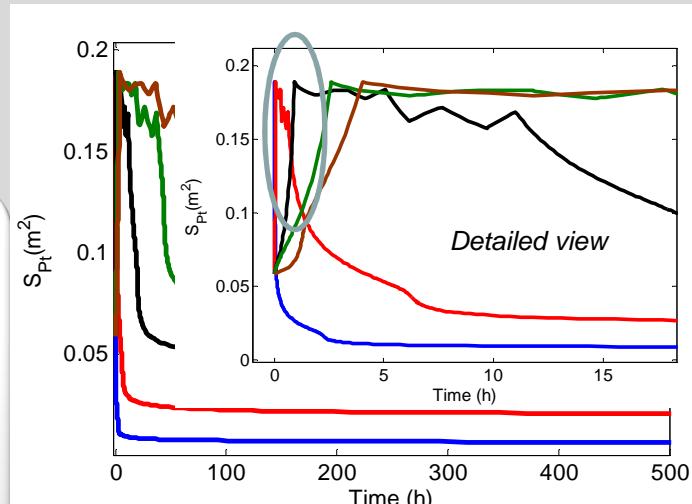
- Impact of nominal current on Pt surface area evolution and ORR ad-species

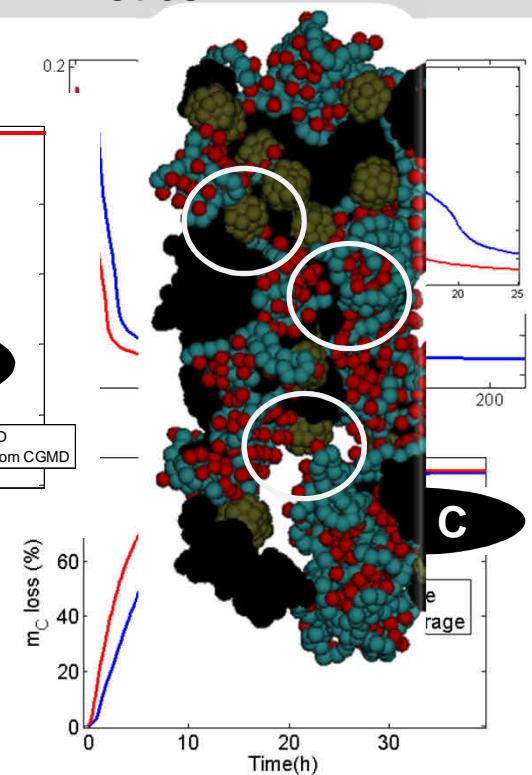
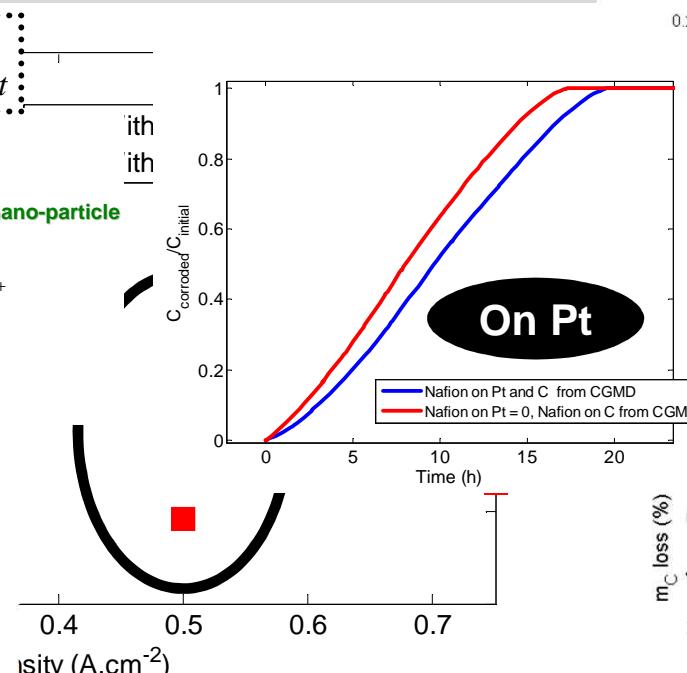
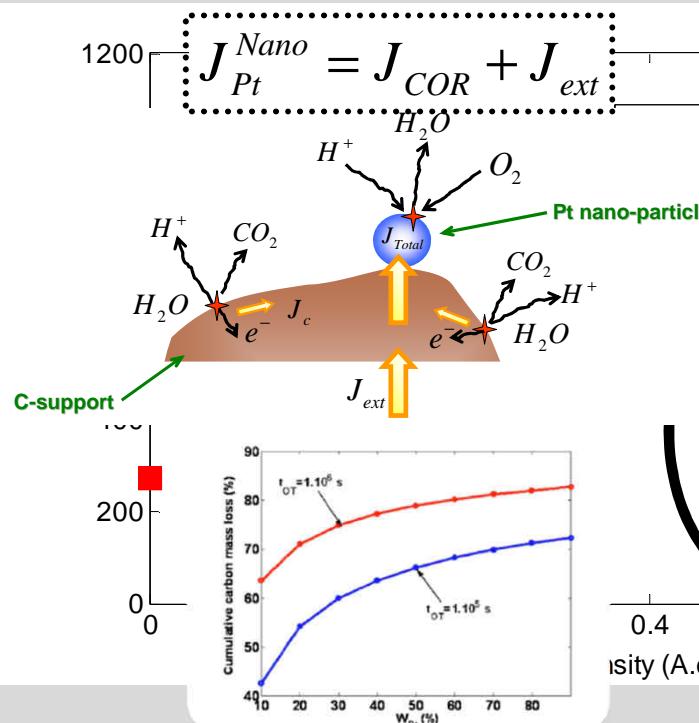


- ✓ Ionomer adsorption on both Pt and C slows down C corrosion and associated catalytic activity loss → extremely important role of the ionomer chemical nature in electrode degradation!
- ✓ Pt catalyzes C corrosion: C corrosion increases as the Pt ORR activity increases (electron pumping mechanism*)
- ✓ Ionomer adsorption on Pt slows down ORR activity → C corrosion rate is slowed down.

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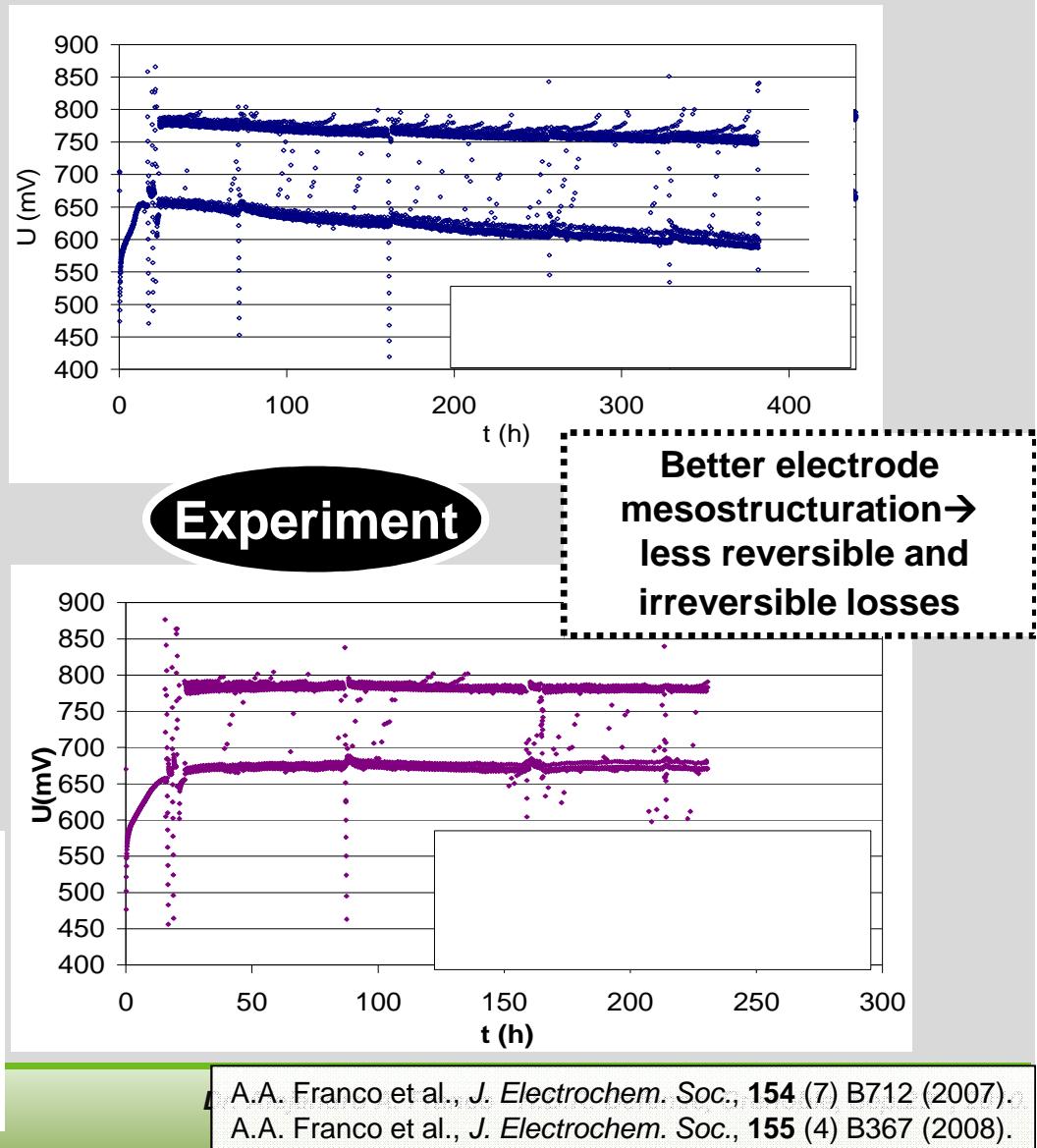
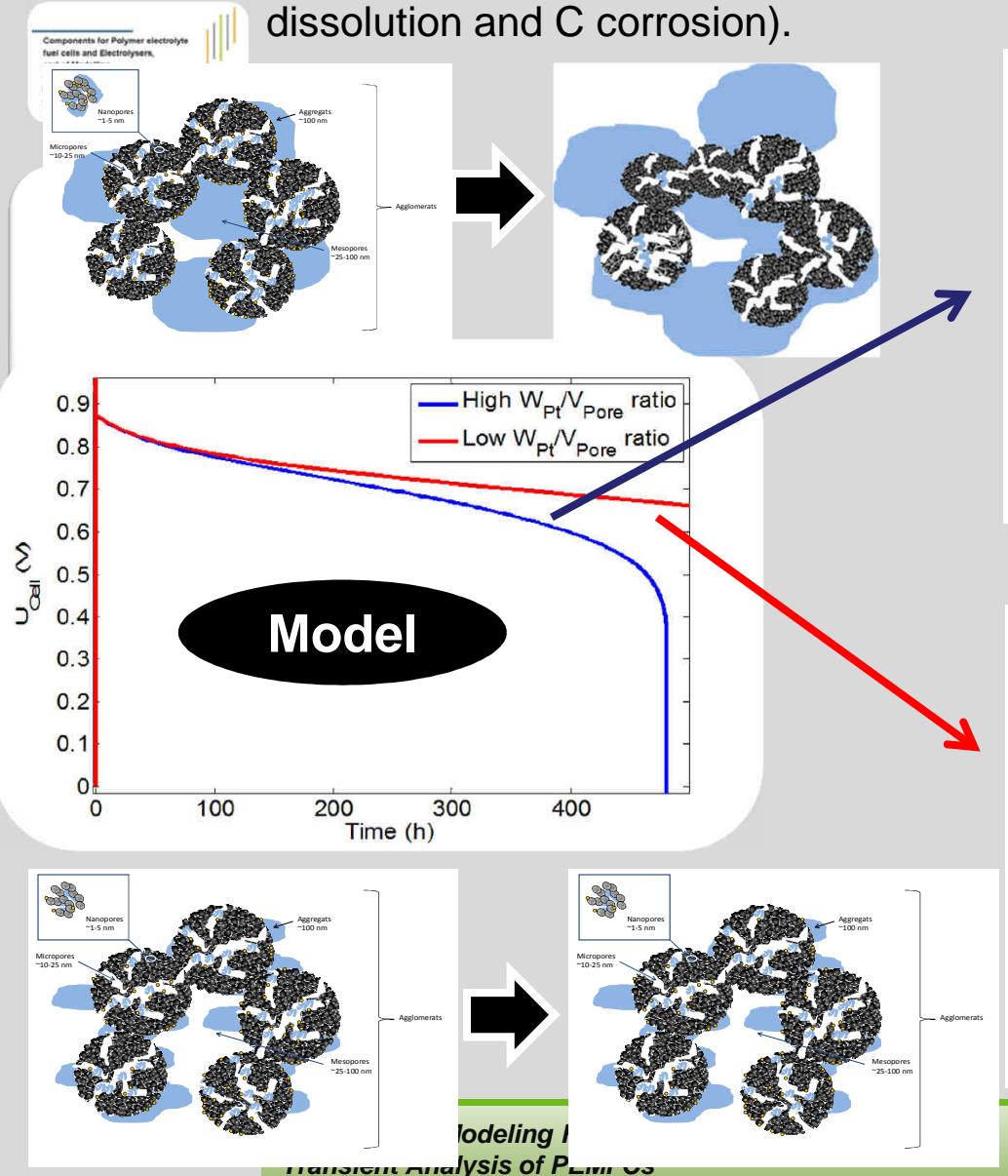

Example #7: impact of W_{Pt}/V_{pore} ratio on performance decay @ I_{min} - I_{max} cycle

- Impact of water flooding on performance decay well reproduced by the model: the increase of Pt loading per unit of pore volume enhances potential decay (flooding, Pt dissolution and C corrosion).

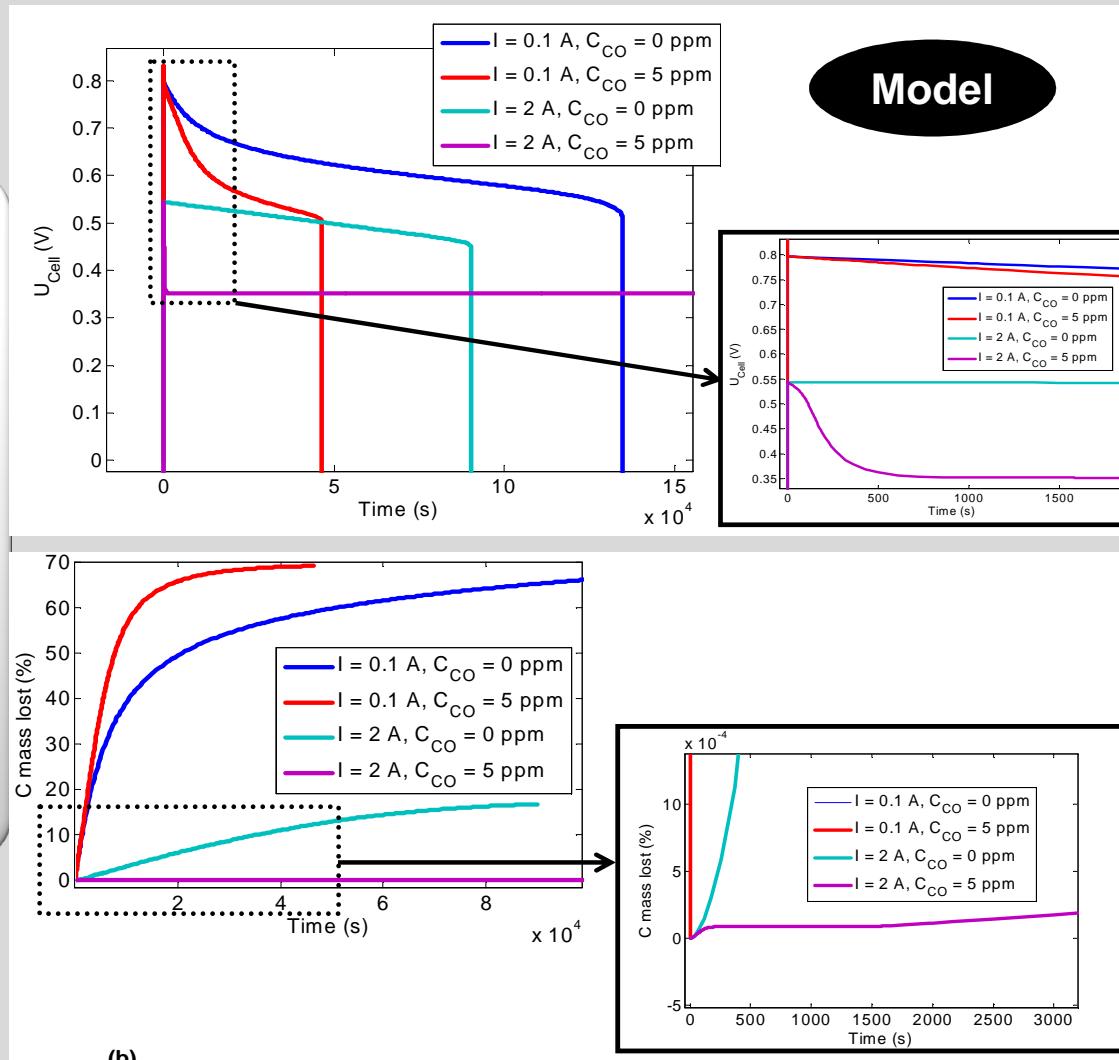
- Non uniformities of aging mechanisms can now be resolved.

- Impact of current and CO concentration on cell potential evolution.

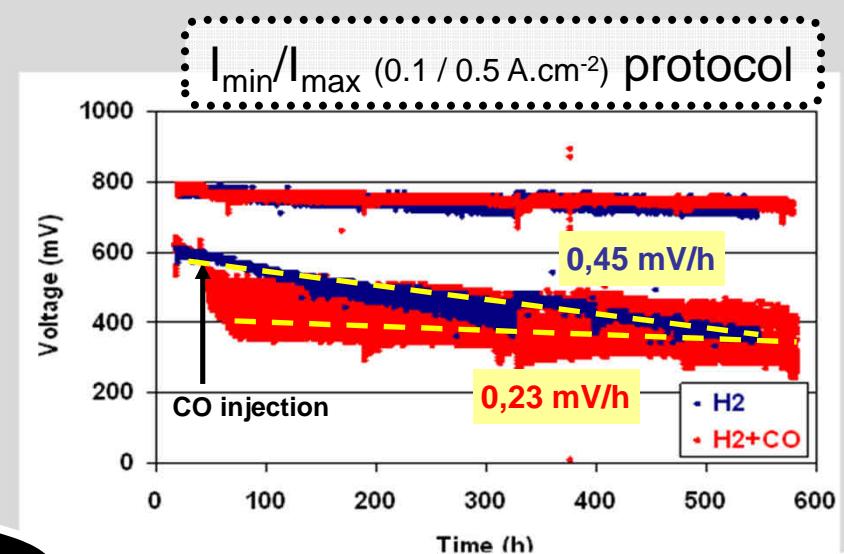
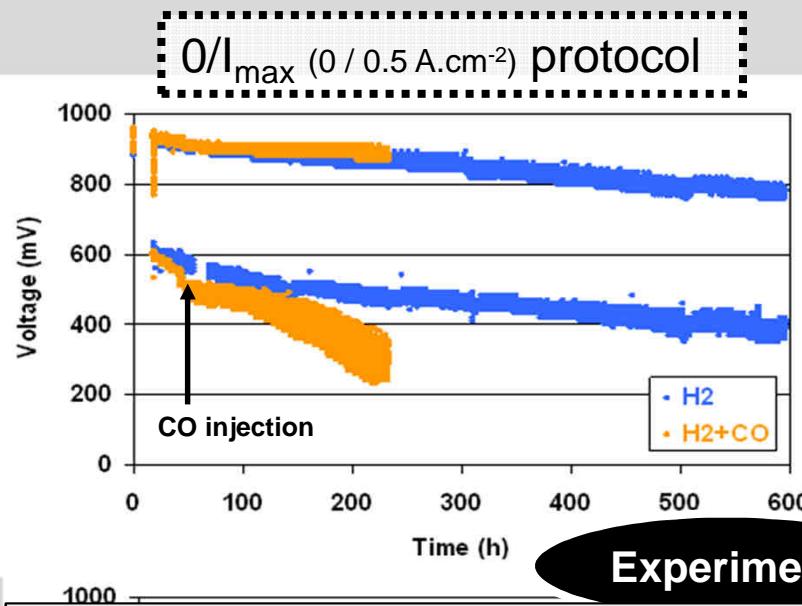


- ✓ For low currents, the potential decay rate increases as the CO concentration increases (strong CO poisoning effect).
- ✓ For higher currents and high CO concentrations, cell potential stabilizes after a strong short-term decay.

- ✓ For low currents, C mass loss increases as the CO concentration increases (more H_2O_2 production in the anode → more PEM degradation → more crossover).
- ✓ For higher currents and high CO concentrations, C mass loss and PEM degradation is mitigated.

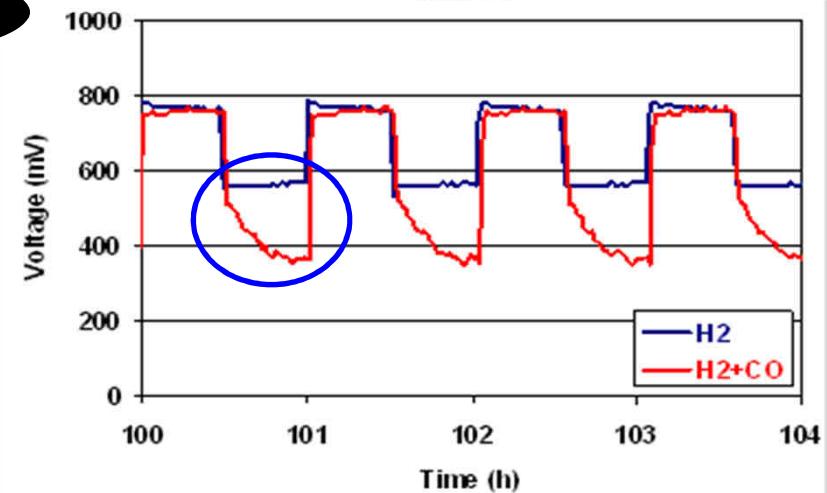
Example #9: impact of external contaminants on MEA durability

- Degradation under pure H₂ and H₂ + CO (5ppm): experiments (complimented with XPS and TEM.).



Experiment

- CO reacts with O₂ (to give CO₂) decreasing
 - the anodic ORR rates and thus decreasing the proton pumping effect → mitigation of cathode carbon corrosion
 - the anodic H₂O₂ production → mitigation of PEM degradation

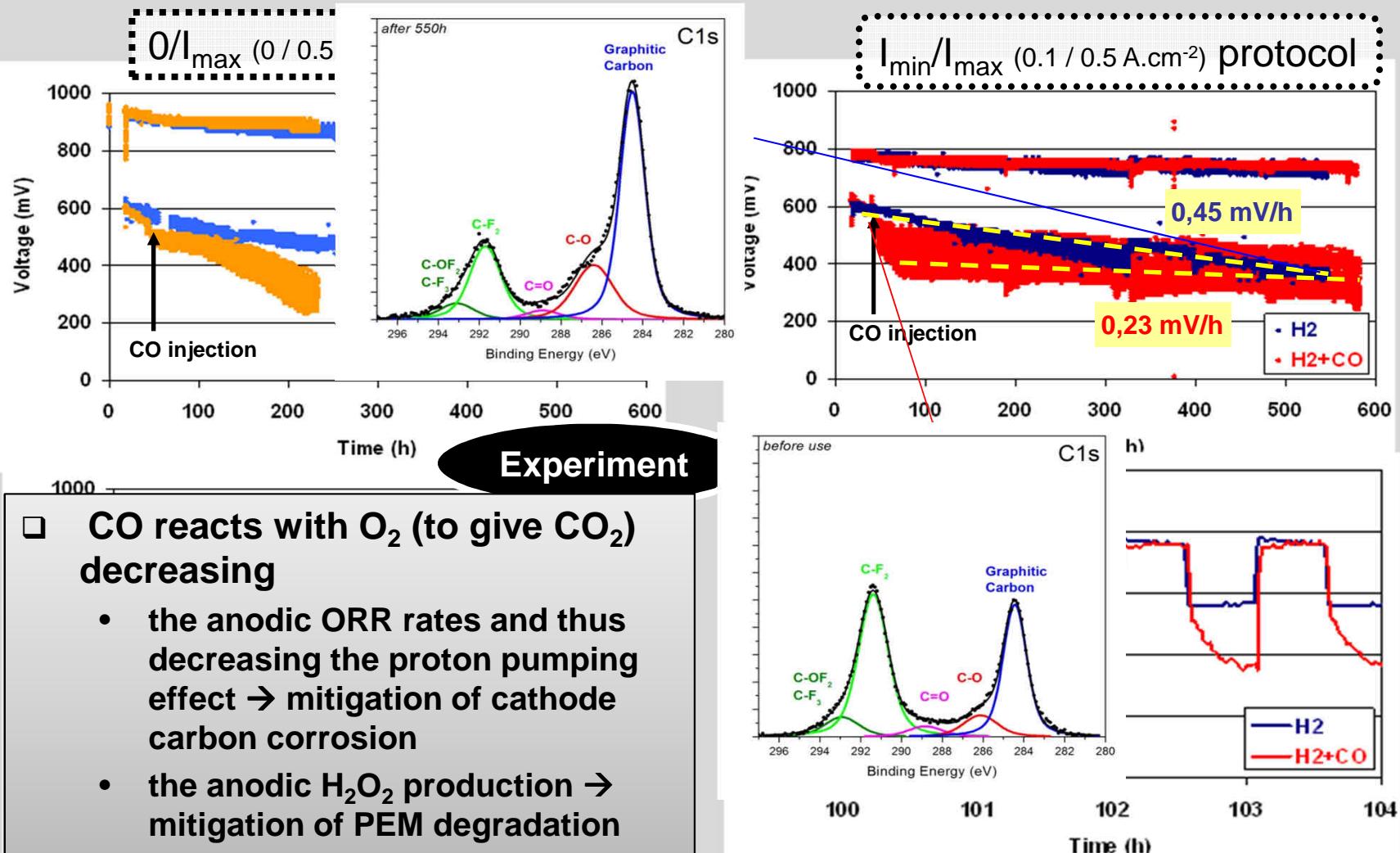

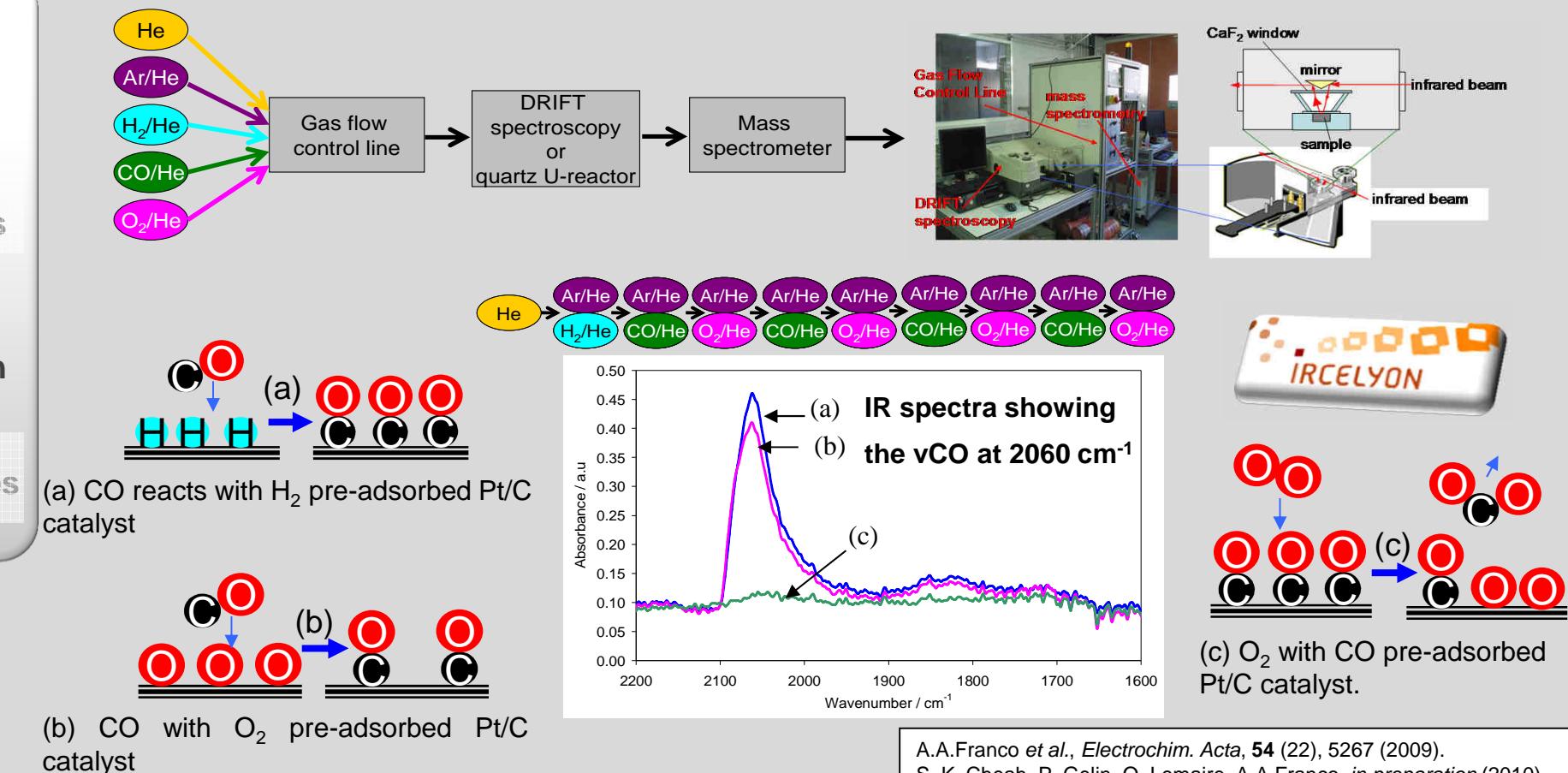
- $\text{CO} + \text{O}_2 \neq \text{O}_2 + \text{CO}$ mechanism experimentally demonstrated using coupled DRIFT-spectroscopy/mass spectrometry and electrochemical half cell.
- **Air bleeding of CO: very low performance reaction vs. using CO to remove O₂ from the surface**
- **Air bleeding can strongly contribute on cathode C corrosion** (cf. A.A. Franco et M. Gerard, *J. Electrochem. Soc.* 2008), and CO can be used to remove crossover O₂ to mitigate C corrosion:

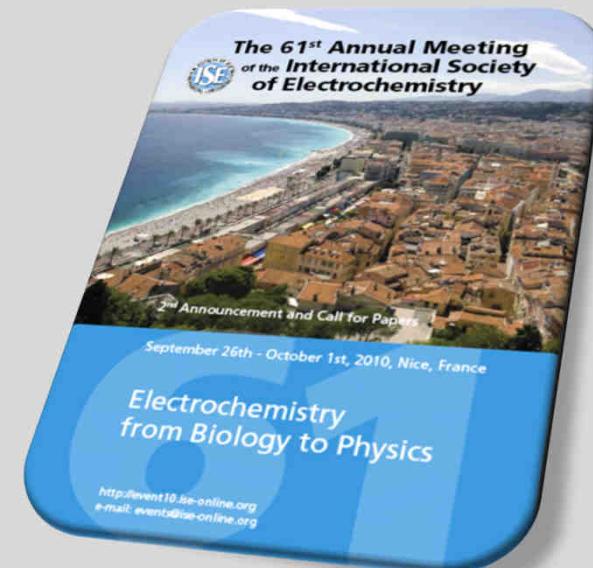

Conclusions

- CEA multiscale/multiphysics model MEMEPhys® allows describing the nanomaterials (e.g. Pt, Pt_xM_y catalysts, C support, PEM...) degradation in in situ PEMFC conditions, on the basis of an *ab initio*-based elementary kinetics/non-equilibrium thermodynamics framework (bottom-up approach):
 - analysis of competitive aging mechanisms and cell durability prediction (**without using empirical Butler-Volmer approach**).
- In practice:
 - experimental observables (polarisation curves, EIS...) from first principles: useful for experiments interpretation.
 - microstructure-performance-durability relationships for the MEA materials: useful for materials design
- Re-usable/evolutive approach:
 - possibility of refining physics in a given module without changing the rest of the model.

Conclusions

- Today, we illustrated the capabilities of our approach through some application examples, including:
 - **Benchmarking** of PEMFC electrocatalysts (activity and durability)
 - **Anode CO contamination enhances the degradation of Pt_xCo_y catalysts.**
 - Possibility of **using CO anode contamination as a mitigation method** of cathode C corrosion and PEM degradation.
 - Revealing the crucial role of **ionomer mesostructure on C corrosion** kinetics
 - Revealing the crucial role of **liquid water on the degradation** mechanisms.

✓ Refining MEMEPhys® modules:

- further detailed descriptions of transport phenomena and electrochemistry -e.g. solvent and ionomer impact on reactions- (ongoing)
- implementation of new phenomena (mechanical stresses, thermal issues)
- continuation of experimental validation (e.g. EU project PREMIUM ACT)
- interpolated relationships for simplified models → stack perspective

✓ Improvement of global MEMEPhys® model:

- structural identifiability analysis
- sympletic discretization methods (e.g. EU project MMM@HPC or joint thesis with LAGEP?)
- user-friendly interface for non-specialists (including experimentalists).
- commercialization perspective within 3-4 years
