1. Tables

Table 1: Slip profiles surface data ('Green table')

Slip profiles data measured at surface, compiled from litterature. Quality weight is assigned depending on age of rupture, timing (i.e., right after the earthquake or not), method and location of measurement, agreement/disagreement of various available measurements. Quality weight ranges from 1 to 3, being higher for best-constrained data. See Appendix 2 for short discussions about the slip profiles. Numbers are under brackets when slip profile is considered only on the main broken fault (see also IDs section)

Table 2: Slip profiles from source inversion models ('Blue table')

Slip profiles data inferred at depth from source inversion model (values concern only along strike data). Data are compiled from Web site of M. Mai (<http://uake-rc.info/SRCMOD/>) and from literature (references of source models are indicated). Quality weight is assigned. See Appendix 2 for more detailed descriptions about quality and discussions about the slip profiles.

Table 3: Surface slip-length data ('Orange table')

Data base modified and expanded from Manighetti et al., 2007. Data are compiled from literature (principal references are indicated). Quality weight is assigned depending on age of rupture, timing (i.e., right after the earthquake or not), method and location of measurement, agreement/disagreement of various available measurements. Quality weight ranges from 0 to 4, being higher for best-constrained data. Quality 0 is assigned to data that are not included in regressions in chapter IV (commonly, earthquakes with unrealistic data or too poorly constrained data). Ruptures with Dmax < 1m are generally assigned a quality of 1, unless I am confident that they are well constrained. Old ruptures (commonly before 1900) are generally assigned a quality of 1 unless they are large and well described in literature. For ruptures having both vertical and lateral slip components reported, we calculated total slip only when long-term fault kinematics indeed reveals an oblique motion; otherwise, only the dominant component of slip was considered. In 'Kinematic column', RE: reverse, NN: normal, S: Strike-slip, LL: left-lateral, LR: left-lateral and reverse, LN: left-lateral and normal, RL: right-lateral, RR: right-lateral and reverse, RN: right-lateral and normal, LV: left-lateral with unclear dip-slip component, RV: right-lateral with unclear dip-slip component, VV: dip-slip rupture whose kinematics is unclear, SR: rupture with lateral and reverse components, SN: rupture with lateral and normal components. 'Azimuth' is mean rupture strike at surface. 'Maturity' is simplified from classes in Table 5 : class 1 for immature, class 2 for intermediate (interm→immature to interm→ mature) and class 3 for mature faults.

Table 4: Slip-length data at depth deduced from inversion models ('Brown table')

Data base modified and expanded from Manighetti et al., 2007. Data are compiled from Web site of M.Mai (<http://uake-rc.info/SRCMOD/>) and from literature (references of source models are indicated). (Dmax,L, W) are original data from models. Mw and M0 are from the Global CMT earthquake catalog. Duration estimated from SCARDEC catalog for the period 1992-2011 and Global CMT for the period 1976-1992. Simplified class of maturity (as in Table 3) is also indicated.

2. Short discussions explaining the choice or rejection of some of the earthquake data

Surface slip profiles data:

Because absolute uncertainties cannot be defined on the surface slip profiles data, I have assigned a quality factor to each slip profile, which depends on several parameters:

- Quality 1: for old earthquakes (before 1950) and not well constrained slip data
- Quality 2: fairly well constrained slip profile for which some uncertainties remain (especially in determination of net displacement)
- Quality 3: Very well constrained slip profile

The slip profiles are numbered S01, S02, etc. ‘S’ for ‘surface data’ and the number of the slip profile as in Table 1. When several slip profiles are available for the same earthquake, I precise in bold the preferred data:

-**S49/S149**: Baja California 2010 (Wei et al., 2011)

Rupture trace was mapped on the field in the NW half of the rupture only. The slip profile estimated from sub-pixel correlation of SPOT/InSAR images (S149) doesn’t take into account the large vertical component and is not in good agreement with the slip profile inferred near the surface from the source inversion model (S49)

→ Quality 1. However, because the slip profile is incomplete, I do not consider it in my overall analysis of slip profiles.

-**S56** : Bogd 1957 (Kurushin et al., 1997 + Choi et al., 2012)

Old earthquake and late studies but displacement measurements fairly dense and precise along the entire rupture length

→ Quality 2

-**S02/102** = Bolu Gerede 1944 (Barka et al., 1996 / Kondo et al., 2005)

Old earthquake and late studies. S02 is less detailed than S102. S102 measured more displacement data but the measurements are disputable (offset of shrubs and small bushes measured 60 years after the earthquake). Also summed displacements might be included in the surface measurements

→ S02 is preferred but with a small quality (1)

-**S03**: Borah Peak 1983 (Crone and Machette 1984; Crone et al., 1987)

Complete and robust study. Surface measurements done in the week following the earthquake

→ Quality 3

- S04: Borrego Mountain 1968 (Clark 1972)

Old earthquake but complete surface measurements along the entire rupture, made from 8h after the earthquake.

→ Quality 2 (to 3)

- S05 : Chi Chi 1999 (Dominguez et al., 2003)

Complete measurements along the entire rupture length. Displacements deduced from the composition of the East and North components of the pixel correlation on Spot images. However the vertical component is not taken into account.

→ Quality 2

-S50 : Darfield 2010 (Quigley et al., 2011)

Complete measurements and rupture analysis both on the field and from Lidar data

→ Quality 3

- **S08/S108** : Denali 2002 (Haeussler et al., 2004 / Eberhardt-Phillips et al., 2003)

Both profiles have a similar overall shape. S08 is preferred because it has more offset measurements along the entire rupture length (ground surface and glacier). Three distinct faults have broken during the earthquake (Susitna Glacier, Denali and Totschunda faults, see IDs for details). The slip profiles do not include slip on the Susitna Glacier oblique reverse fault.

In some cases discussed later on, I will have to only discuss the slip on the Denali fault; I will thus ignore the part of the slip profiles which show the slip on the Totschunda fault.

→ Quality 2 (but particular case because several faults have broken during the earthquake)

- **S44** : Dixie Valley 1954 (Caskey et al., 1996)

Old earthquake and late study but surface measurements are dense and robust along the entire rupture length. Net displacement calculated using fault dips described in the literature (see IDs for details)

→ Quality 1

- **S46/146** : Duzce 1999 (Duman et al., 2005 / Akyuz et al., 2002)

Both profiles are very similar (length, displacements), and both result from precise and dense measurements along the rupture length. S46 is slightly preferred because Duman et al., 2005 present a more detailed surface mapping.

Slip profile at surface is symmetric whereas slip profile inferred at depth shows a more asymmetric slip profile with maximum displacement deported to the west

→ Quality 2

- **S58**: El Asnam 1980 (Yielding et al., 1981)

Surface measurements done 10 days after the earthquake. Uncertainties on the estimation of the net displacement (reverse component)

→ Quality 2

- **S09**: Elmore Ranch 1987 (Hudnut et al., 1989)

The slip profile is the sum of the displacements that occurred on the 6 parallel tiny branches.

Even if surface measurements are detailed, displacements are very low (10 cm); the earthquake occurred in a complex fault zone in interaction with the Superstition Hills fault and that broke the perpendicular Superstition Hills fault a few hours after the Elmore Ranch .

→ Quality 1 but because of the reasons above, I will not consider this surface slip profile in my analyses

- **S10**: Erzincan 1939 (Barka et al., 1996)

Old earthquake and late study

→ Quality 1

- **S59**: Fairview Peak 1954 (Caskey et al., 1996)

Late study but dense surface measurements along the entire rupture length. Net displacement calculated by composition of horizontal and vertical components and using fault dips described in the literature (see IDs for details)

→ Quality 1

- **S13**: Fandoqa 1998 (Berberian et al., 2001)

Measurements done 3 days after the earthquake and over a period of one year. Strike slip major component with a minor reverse component that can induce uncertainties on the net displacement estimation.

→ Quality 2

- **S14/S114**: Fort Tejon 1857 (Sieh et al., 1978 / Zielke et al., 2012)

Old earthquake that occurred over a very long distance. Late studies reported different maximum displacements (D_{max} [Sieh et al. 1978] = 9 m ; D_{max} [Zielke et al. 2012] = 6 m). However both profiles have a similar overall shape (see IDs for details)

S114 is preferred because Zielke et al. (2012) provide solid arguments against the over-estimated maximum slip measurement done by Sieh et al. (1978).

→ Quality 1

-S57: Fuyun 1931 (Jianbang et al., 1984 + Lin and Lin 1998)

Old earthquake. Late studies but in good agreement with each other (see IDs for details). Dense measurements on the 2/3 southern part of the rupture. The northern part is less described.

→ Quality 1

S19 : Hebgen Lake 1959 (Myers and Hamilton 1964)

Old earthquake but surface measurements done a few days after the mainshock. Complete and precise mapping of the rupture. However the major part of the slip measurements takes into account offsets likely due to landsliding. This part must not be included in the on fault displacement.

→ Not included in my analysis because of these reasons.

-S22/122 : Hector Mine 1999 (Jonsson et al., 2002 / Treiman et al., 2002)

Dense surface measurements (S122) in good agreement with InSAR measurements (S22). S22 is preferred because it is more sensible to ground deformation at rupture tips, not necessarily visible on the field.

→ Quality 3

- S23 : Imperial Valley 1979 (Sharp et al., 1982)

Study done 4 days after the earthquake. Surface measurements dense along the rupture length. However at least 5 km of rupture trace is missing near the hypocenter (uncertainties on the rupture length). Small amplitude of the surface displacements (suggesting that part of the deformation was diffused? Surface slip under-estimated?)

→ Quality 1

- S60 : Imperial Valley 1940 (Sharp et al., 1982)

Old earthquake. Late study but fairly complete along the entire rupture length.

→ Quality 1
